

“Great achievement comes with a high price, a price most people are not willing to pay,” Roy Black shares as he recalls his first job as a trial attorney. Then being one of only ten attorneys of Dade County, the Senior Partner of Black, Srebnick, Kornspan & Stumpf, P.A. did not have the luxury of training as he started a murder trial the day after being sworn in. At present, Black over-prepares not only for trials but for everything which makes him a valuable asset of the firm. Aside from being a prime litigator, Black and his wife hopes to make a difference by establishing “The Consequences Charity” which offers services and support for troubled youth and provides them with a second chance in life. He proudly works beside his wife, who he calls a “fundraising phenomena” in order to keep kids out of jail and educate them.

“Many lawyers have the will to win but only a few have the will to prepare. Had I prepared for the Ironman with the same intensity that I prepared for trial of a criminal securities fraud case, my race time surely would have been faster,” Howard Srebnick recalls after participating in the inaugural Miami Ironman 70.3. The Black, Srebnick, Kornspan & Stumpf partner shares that their firm devotes an enormous amount of time and effort in the preparation for a case. The team of lawyers, including Srebnick, and paralegals endure sleepless nights to insure that their clients have the best chance of success. Aside from legal work, Srebnick serves as a race director of the cycling group Zensah Team Lifeline. It raises money for Chai Lifeline, a charity that provides services to families with children suffering from cancer and other life threatening illnesses.
